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Key issues

Dis- and misinformation create strong emotional or 'affective' responses.

O2 Strong beliefs make it difficult to counter dis- and misinformation.

Dis- and misinformation are tied to long-standing discriminatory views and biases.

MISINFORMATION

— The inadvertent sharing of false information.

(Farkas and Schou 2018, 299; Tandoc Jr et al. 2018, 140)

DISINFORMATION — Intentional falsehoods spread as news stories.

(Bennett and Livingston 2018, 124)

Misinformation is generated for multiple reasons.





Persistence of mis- and disinformation

- Financial benefits for platforms
- Ease and speed of replication
- lssues with automatic detection and reporting systems
- Time consuming and expensive to disprove
- Cognitive dissonance and motivated reasoning

A man with a conviction is a hard man to change.



Suppose that he is presented with evidence, unequivocal and undeniable evidence, that his belief is wrong: what will happen? The individual will frequently emerge, not only unshaken, but even more convinced of the truth of his beliefs than ever before.

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
